SEASONAL SUGGESTIONS

A good potting mix may include a small amount of bone meal and Ironite to encourage development of new fine rootage. There is a difference of opinion as to the value of including cottonseed meal at this time, however we believe that this fertilizer is better applied a month or so later since early feeding can be harmful to new growth. Cottonseed meal is a slow starter before it adds any nutrient benefit to the plant.

Reotted plants may be fed as soon as signs of new growth are apparent. A suggested mix is 75% cottonseed meal / 25% bone meal.

Newly potted trees should be shaded from direct sun until new growth begins. By moving trees into sunny areas, it will stimulate the growth of foliage. Newly potted trees should first be allowed to develop new fine rootage that can then support new foliage. When new growth is evident, it's time to begin light fertilization. Full sun encourages smaller leaves and shorter internodes.

Early bloomers such as Forsythia, Sasanqua Camellias and Quince develop during early spring months. After flowers have faded, trees are pruned to restore shape, allow new growth and bud setting.

Azaleas are bare rooted and repotted in March. Be sure to comb out as much of the old soil or growing medium peat without destroying the fine root system. Incorporate as much new coarse azalea soil mix as you can when repotting to develop strong healthy new roots and improve acidity.

Finally, prepare selected trees for display at the many spring bonsai shows held throughout the state. Select your best tree(s)--be critical of their appearance. Show trees should be free of any infections and should not show signs of ill health. Pots should be clean. Plants surface must be cleared of trash and very heavy layers of moss. Spring is usually the time when most trees look their very best.

Remember---- For every action there is an equal and opposite criticism.

Doesn't this seem to apply to bonsai? The best way to escape your problem is to solve it.



Bonsai Pavilion at the Safari Park

Even though March had record high early spring temperatures this year, we still had much routine winter maintenance. About 100 bonsai were fertilized with slow release pellets. Three of the larger displayed bonsai were also transplanted with new soils and replaced on their respective benches. A very nice large procumbens nana cascade in a traditional cascade bonsai pot was donated to the Pavilion by SDBC newcomers, Jenny and Joe Cho. They have been having weekend sales of their bonsai also due to a planned move. We appreciate their generous gift. Marty Mann has also donated another large old maple group bonsai planting in a large glazed oval pot from his collection. It is most generous of our members to remember the Pavilion when they are “downsizing” their collections. Our newly expanded work area will have several new benches to house these significant trees that are being groomed for future display.

The volunteers often have short meeting breaks during our work sessions to discuss schedules and upcoming work in the garden areas as well as with the bonsai. Also, it’s a good time to discuss with the group any problems that anyone may detect. . .ie insects, faulty water spitters/emitters, washed out areas, etc. Presently, we also are preparing programs for April, June, and October for Park visitors at the request of Safari Horticulture. These sessions will be held in the Pavilion during our work sessions to introduce the art of bonsai and techniques to casual Park visitors and to answer questions with more detailed presentations. We are also preparing for the annual visit to the Pavilion of all our SDBC members for the annual picnic and silent auction on May 17th which will also be a meeting day for the SDBC. Pre sign-ups for that meeting will be at the April SDBC meeting at Balboa Park. It is important that members sign up so that we will have enough tables, chairs, and passes for everyone. This year, this meeting will take place in the Pavilion instead of Kapanda so members will have a better opportunity to see the working areas with the volunteers.

In preparation for the May 17th Picnic Party, all the volunteers are doing a great spring cleaning and sprucing up of the Pavilion. Special thanks to Ron Ogdon for diligent pond cleaning. He keeps his hip boots ready at each session! Very special kudos to Jim Kirchmer and Charlie Mosse for assessing and procuring new gravel and bark and peeler poles, etc. to renew worn out spaces throughout the Pavilion. They and a few more volunteers have been putting in extra hours and days to have the Pavilion ready for the May meeting. We are also looking forward to greeting special guests visiting the Pavilion during the SDBC’s 50th Anniversary Celebration weekend on April 25th and 26th including a bonsai study group from Phoenix, Arizona. Thanks to the Safari Park Staff also who have been tree trimming along the outer fences of the Pavilion as we requested.
